Heritage is anything from the past that people identify with, or something which is handed down through generations. Heritage is also concerned with how the past shapes the present and future – in, for example, tourist attractions, museum exhibitions, cultural identities, post-conflict reconciliation, planning policies, and nature conservation schemes.

The study of heritage at ATU is broad, dynamic, and multidisciplinary – drawing critical insights from heritage studies and related fields. These include archaeology, architecture, cartography, climatology, cinema, creative & cultural industries, digital humanities, ecology, e-commerce & entrepreneurship, environmental management, field studies, folklore, genealogy, geography, GIS, history, language & literature, music & song, planning, memory studies, museology, and sustainability.

What to expect

Heritage students learn through a lively and practical hands-on learning experience, delivered by lecturers with many years of experience working in third-level education and the heritage sector. In-person lectures and classroom discussions are supplemented by regular off-site fieldtrips to heritage sites, interpretative centres, and museums throughout Ireland and abroad.

Learning also takes place by means of library work, labs, and Virtual Learning Environments (VLEs). Research-informed teaching, Work-Integrated Learning (WIL), Universal Design for Learning (UDL), and the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) are important features of our heritage programmes.
