Kathie Nally: BSc (Hons) in Computer Service Management, 2008

My professional life began in the equestrian industry. When I finished my Leaving Cert in Ireland I went to Belgium, aged 17, and basically spent the next 20 years working with horses all over Europe. Often I was the IT support service in the bigger more modern yards that had computers as I had taken the computer class in school.

I decided to return to Ireland in 2004 just before the Tiger arrived. I was struggling to find a job when my mother heard on the radio that there was an IT course starting in GMIT Castlebar the following year. Knowing that I was actively interested in computers she advised me to apply and I went on to study the B.Sc (Hons) in Computer Services Management, graduating in 2008.

I applied last-minute for the Masters course in NUIG shortly after finishing in GMIT and was accepted, graduating in 2010. For my

Masters project and thesis I found an internship at the EPFL in Lausanne Switzerland (Ecole polytechnique fédérale de Lausanne) and eventually moved back to live and work.

I work mainly on small missions for short term contracts, I work for several small NGOs on a voluntary basis. Here in Switzerland there exists a huge gap between the amount of women working in IT and their male counterparts. Around 300 new IT jobs appear in the main Swiss Government search engine every day. There



are not enough graduates in Switzerland to meet the demand. Most jobs are in Finance or large multi-nationals, 90% require English and one of the national languages, and just over 60% require a Masters in a relevant field. I find it sad to see that in the past 12 years or so the amount of women taking up IT has not grown. It is a very interesting field to be in with all the amazing changes happening all the time and GMIT Castlebar is the perfect place to start that amazing journey



Laura Murphy: BSc (Hons) in IT Service Management, 2015

My journey in the IT industry started when I was given the role of LAN Administrator in a company. That role was dissolved when the company outsourced its IT solutions. After a career of over 12 years with that organisation, looking back I realised it was my most enjoyable role so I decided to return to third-level, joining GMIT Mayo. Going back to college was tough at times but very worthwhile. I got great support from my classmates and from my lecturers, which went a long way. The topics we covered and the practical assignments were really engaging and satisfying. Diversity and gender diversity are being proven to have huge advantages to business and innovation. When women are great users of technology, why shouldn't they be involved in the creation of great technology?
