12.	Programme Rationale:	The overall aim of the proposed Special Purpose Award is to offer an opportunity for professional and emerging designers to develop skills of research, critical reflection and design practices, situated in an environment that inspires creativity and innovation.							
13.	Potential Demand for Entry:	19 – 24 places There is interest in the programme from designers in Ireland and overseas.							

14.	Stakeholder Engagement:	A number of design experts from Ireland and abroad have agreed to participate in the delivery of the proposed programme.
15.	Graduate Demand:	Graduates should have the potential to develop collaborative partnerships and to further develop their professional network from an international perspective.
16.	Entry Requirements, Access, Transfer & Progression:	Applicants must have a level 8 or equivalent award in a design discipline. Applicants must submit a digital portfolio in order to be considered for a place on the programme. Portfolios must showcase creativity and personality and the application of effective design principles. Portfolios will be graded, and those receiving 40% or above will be ranked in order to allocate places.
		Applicants with a level 7 award may also apply (or students in year 3 of a 4-year design programme) by portfolio but must provide a certified copy of results of modules/stages completed to date and complete a personal statement in order to be considered for a place.
17.	Programme Structure:	The programme consists of one 10 ECTS module called 'Design Unplugged'.
		It is envisaged that the primary delivery of the programme will take place during a 2 week summer school, with participants required to engage in work prior to and following these weeks.
18.	Learning, Teaching & Assessment Strategies:	The two weeks of the summer school will be structured into morning workshops led and facilitated by lecturers. The research and creative elements of the programme will be located in the design studio on the Letterfrack Campus. Afternoons will be focused on research and exploration of the local land- and seascapes through organised field trips and personal exploration. Reading, researching, discussions and presentations will be integral to the learning strategies adopted for the programme. Participants will engage in 'desk crits' with teaching staff and daily 'pin-up' reviews of work with their studio groups. At the end of the delivery period students will produce a public group exhibition.
		Assessment will involve a precedent research study, workshops and excursions, final design and exhibition and a reflective journal.

19.	Resource Implications:	The panel is satisfied that the programme will be staffed by people with suitable experience and expertise. Details of the programme board composition should be specified in the proposal document. The organisation of a programme after June 20 th is outside the normal period of teaching expected and any exceptional employment arrangements should be fully documented for the information of the Executive. Technical support will also be required. It is planned that this programme will be self-funding, and that the fee paid by participants will cover all costs.

	Recommendations:	The panel welcomed the development of this programme and in particular were very complimentary of the novel delivery structure targeting a practitioner cohort. It was felt that the development of this type of programme was in line with GMIT's strategy to increase flexible delivery and CPD programmes.			
		The panel expressed serious concern about the fact that the programme is being advertised on the Design West website as an approved level 9 programme which is in breach of Code of Practice No. 2. This needs to be removed with immediate effect.			
		The panel approves the programme subject to the following conditions (8) and recommendations (5):

		 The programme as presented does not satisfy the student workload requirement for 10 ECTS. The proposers need to address the issue of student workload so that it is fully aligned with the proposed ECTS. Programme learning outcomes need to be revised to ensure that they are expressed at level 9, using the QQI design award standards as reference. The number of learning outcomes should be appropriate for the size of the programme. Module learning outcomes need to be revised to ensure that they are expressed appropriately for the module level.
